### Annual Chili Feed and Holiday Bazaar November 14-15




### **Renovations To First Floor Underway**

Over the past several years, the historical society and Deschutes County have worked together on the removal of aging carpets and tile from Historic Reid School. This has not been a fast or easy project owing to the fact that underneath the carpet, asbestos tiles waited. The month of October became a benchmark for the society as the very last of the asbestos tiles were finally removed!

The two exhibit galleries on the first floor, featuring exhibits on the mills, logging, Forest Service, Native Americans, fur trapping and exploration were the last two spaces with the old flooring. Removing just the flooring ended up not being the only question, however. The lathe and plaster walls behind some of the exhibits showed every bit of their 100 years in age. Large sections were in need of repair, so the decision was made to commit to fresh plaster repair for both rooms on all four walls.

Removal of flooring led to the discovery that the original hardwood flooring had mostly been removed years ago. The hardwood floor was completely gone in one room, half hard wood floor and half plywood subflooring in the other. In the back corner of the forestry room, the built in cabinet in fact hid a steam pipe that went no where and a substantial hole in the floor. The Board of Directors agreed that now was the opportune time for repairs.

Exhibit stories from these rooms have moved to the second floor, and two temporary exhibits will be the first in the renovated spaces: Pet Tales, an exhibit of historic pet photographs, will open later in November (see story on page 3) and Finding Fremont travels from Nevada State Museum in April.

Following the Annual Chili Feed and Holiday Bazaar, a gallery hanging system will be installed that enables the Museum to hang exhibit photographs and panels without puncturing the plaster. The project has brought much needed repairs to our beloved school building, and the hanging system will help preserve the plaster walls while at the same time offers more exhibit space for new and exciting exhibits. It was no small task to empty both exhibit rooms, and we could not have done it with out our volunteers. Thank you to all who helped with the heavy lifting and dirty work!



# Oregon Historical Society Leads National Statuary Hall Commission

National Statuary Hall was created by Congress in 1864, and over the past 150 years, each state has sent statues of two "worthy individuals" to be displayed in Washington, D.C. In 1921, the Oregon State Legislature recommended that Jason Lee and Dr. John McLoughlin represent our state, and in 1953 those statues were placed in Statuary Hall. As time passed, some state legislatures expressed interest in replacing historical figures who no longer best represented the history and values of their state. In 2000, Congress adopted legislation allowing states to replace their statues.


On August 20, 2014, Governor John Kitzhaber established the Statuary Hall Study Commission Executive Order to determine whether Oregon's statues of John McLoughlin and Jason Lee should remain or be replaced by other notable Oregonians. The Commission consists of nine voting members—five appointed by the Governor, two appointed by Senate President Peter Courtney, and two appointed by Speaker of the House Tina Kotek.

The Commission is charged with studying and recommending to the 2015 Oregon Legislative Assembly whether to replace one or both of Oregon's statues. If a replacement is recommended, the Commission, with input from Oregonians, will recommend which individual(s) should be honored in the National Statuary Hall Collection. The Commission is required to make its recommendation to the Legislature by February 4, 2015.

The Statuary Hall Study Commission invites all Oregonians to participate in the recommendation process. Online submissions are being accepted on whether your think John McLoughlin and/or Jason Lee should remain in National Statuary Hall, and, if not, which individuals should be recommended as replacements.

Executive Director Kelly Cannon-Miller was prominently featured on the front page of the Monday, November 3 edition of *The Bulletin* where she discussed the choice of Governor Tom McCall as a candidate for Statuary Hall. Tom McCall was raised on the family ranch near Prineville and is buried in Redmond Memorial Cemetery.
