



# Sneak Preview: Deschutes County's Mountain Bike Pioneers by Rebekah Averette

Tourists and potential residents flock to Central Oregon every year to sample many of the outdoor pursuits we have to offer. We are a region of avid downhill and Nordic skiers, kayakers and paddle boarders, rock climbers, road cyclists, hikers, trail runners, and of course, mountain bikers.

Known today as a mecca for mountain bikers, Central Oregon boasts an extensive and ever-growing network of trails. These trails include the beloved and legendary "Phil's Trail" network, named after Phil Meglasson when he kicked off a frenzy of largely unsanctioned local trail building in 1985. The explosion of these rogue trails and ensuing tensions with USFS eventually helped lead to the 1992 birth of the Central Oregon Trail Alliance. Still thriving today, the group now boasts over 600 members and a network of hundreds of miles of single-track trails developed in coordination with the Bureau of Land Management and the USFS.



Few people, however, know the true story of the scrappy, grubby pioneering roots of our local mountain biking (MTB) scene. An exhibit slated to open in the fall of 2022, DCHS, assisted by local biking legends, Bob "Reverend Lester Polyester" Woodward and Dennis "Heaterdog" Heater, will tell the story of how our little pocket of high desert became a haven for MTB enthusiasts from around the world.

As Bob Woodward tells it, in the late 70's a boom in off-road

cycling in Marin County, CA started to catch on with the outdoorsy residents of Central Oregon. Long before today's riders were dropping serious cash on seriously expensive bikes and accoutrements, "klunker bikes" and their passionate riders began appearing on the game trails and old logging roads of Central Oregon.

The early MTB era in Bend was characterized, as Woodward puts it, by a rebellious "outlaw" spirit. The riders rode hard and played hard; there was an air of spirited revelry mixed with serious riding. Several local "rider tribes" sprang up, including Woodward's "Klister Korner" crew (named after, of all things, a particularly messy cross-county ski wax) and Heater's "Black Rock Gang," comprised of veteran off-road motorcyclists who embraced the new sport with passion. The groups organized local events including cruiser crawls spanning several days and bar-to-bar rallies. When asked why the early riders favored the "klunker bikes," Heater explained that the simple bikes were both cheap and plentiful. As evidenced from early photos of local riders on Awbrey Butte and Heater's own carefully maintained riding journals, the early days of Bend Mountain Biking were adrenalin-fueled

explorations of the local terrain.

The popularity of the sport in the community led to the growth of industry surrounding mountain biking. Shops, such as Century Cycles sprang up and local Black Rock member, Brad Stankey began producing the Speed and Research Outback Bike. In 1983, the area's first official mountain bike race, the Cascade Cruise, was held at Mt. Bachelor.

DCHS is excited to share the images, artifacts, and stories of Central Oregon's early mountain bikers, coming in Fall 2022.

# NEW EXHIBIT: Oregon's **Landmark Legislation** Open August 2—September 5

Central Oregon's own Governor Tom McCall was the force behind some of Oregon's most well-known pieces of revolutionary legislation.

### Fishing for Funds!

Something fishy is going down at the Deschutes Historical Museum. Inspired by fiber artist Maya Hahn, grab your rod and reel and join the museum as we go Fishing for Funds!

After a 30 year career teaching art, Hahn decided she wanted to 'Pay it Forward' and use her art to help others. Hahn makes use of her fiber art background by upcycling wool and cashmere sweaters into blankets, pins and, now, life size steelhead salmon fish. Each fish takes her about five hours to make. Many are made from Pendleton wool shirts, others from upholstery fabrics or other woolens.

"I believe turning something from a possible landfill item into a one-of-a-kind piece of functional art gives new purpose to both myself and donors." Each fish is a piece of

art and Hahn's fish recently helped raise over \$2,000 for UNICEF for the children of Ukraine.

How does our fundraiser work? Here at the museum, from **August 13 to September 10** we're launching a special exhibit about the history of fishing, incorporating Hahn's colorful fish. To participate, simply:

Fishing has a long history in Central Oregon, like the time in 1903 when 1,945 fish were caught in 3 days and barbecued at Bend's first Fourth of July celebration. Your

### **Rastovich Farms Honored As Oregon Century Farm**

Congratulations are in order to the Rastovich family as Rastovich Farms becomes the first Deschutes County farm recognized as an official Oregon Century Farm.

The Oregon Century Farm and Century Ranch Program recognizes farmers and ranchers whose family has worked the same land for at least 100 years. Started in 1958, it is one of the oldest agricultural heritage programs in the country. The Rastovich family first homesteaded their property east of Bend in 1919. The Century Farm and Century Ranch program is a partnership between the Oregon Farm Bureau, Wilco, Oregon State Historic Preservation Office, and OSU Libraries' University Archives.
