Map and Document of the Quarter

The next time you visit the Deschutes Historical Museum, carve out some time to explore the Map and Document of The Quarter. Volunteer researcher and board member, Brad Lemmon, encounters many interesting maps and documents while working in the DHM archive. "As I spend more and more time at the museum, I become aware of the amount of interesting things that are in the drawers and boxes. I want people to see more of those things than they get to see in the permanent or rotating exhibits."

The January – March 2026 Document of the Quarter is a 1918 Tumalo Telephone Directory that was mailed to F. V. Swisher with a 2-cent stamp.

The Map of the Quarter is *Waterworks Plans* from December 1924. For Bend, it shows the "location of houses requiring water supply."

NEW: Recipe of The Month

Fresh off the Holiday Gelatin Salad Show, we are launching a new feature. Each month, museum staff will select a historic recipe to examine, make, and taste test. To kick it off, let's look at the 1917 *Tumalo Cookbook*, *Favorite Recipes Collected and Published by the West Side Ladies*, where Mrs. F.N. Wallace offers this gem:

Spaghetti

About a bowl full of spaghetti boiled tended in salt water. Then drain the water off. One large onion and about a quarter of a pound of bacon ground together then fried to a light brown. About 7 or 8 cents worth of cheese ground, mix all together. Cover with milk, season with salt and pepper, bake half an hour.

What size bowl? How much cheese is 7 or 8 cents worth in 1917? More importantly, what was Mrs. Wallace's given name, since F.N. was her husband?

New Exhibit Coming Soon: "A Changing Landscape"

There are changes coming to the northeast first floor gallery, which has been home to "Klunkers and Stumpjumpers" for the past three years. On loan from the Oregon Historical Society, "A Changing Landscape" photographically documents the effects of climate change on Oregon's landscape.

Using modern and historical photographs, visitors will visually compare 100 years of environmental change across Oregon's most recognized mountains, lakes, and glaciers.

Remembering Martin Tobin Winch

March 9, 1944 - November 26, 2025

Martin Tobin Winch died on November 26, 2025 at the age of 81 at OHSU Hospital, of complications from cancer.

"We've had a wonderful life," he said to us.

Martin was born in Portland on March 9, 1944 to Simeon and Mary Winch. He went to high school at Portsmouth Priory in Rhode Island and college at Princeton, graduating in 1966 with a degree in history. After college, Martin was a VISTA volunteer, working with migrant agricultural workers in Texas, and then moved to Denver where he completed his law degree (1971), and met Carolyn. They married on September 4, 1971, and settled in Tumalo, Oregon, where they built a house and pastures and had two children, Paula (1972) and Peter (1977).

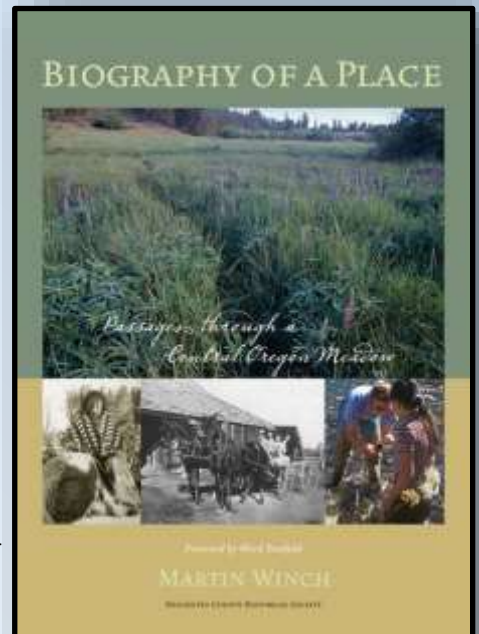
Martin worked for Tumalo Irrigation District and wrote a history on the subject (Tumalo, Thirsty Land) published in the Oregon Historical Quarterly in 1984-86, and with Carolyn created Deschutes Independent School. They lived in Tumalo again between 1998 and 2009. He dedicated himself to the restoration of Whychus Creek, with Deschutes Basin Land Trust, and wrote Biography of a Place: Passages through a Central Oregon Meadow.

In the 1990s, in Portland, he had his happiest professional years as Executive Director of Jesuit Volunteer Corps Northwest – a role that he loved for the young people at its center and the focus on service and community. Later in life, Martin became a mediator in court, sang in a choir, established native plants, tended to roadsides in the neighborhood, and embraced mentorship opportunities.

Martin was diagnosed with mesothelioma in September 2023. Treatment allowed him to live in robust health for another two years, taking care of Carolyn in her last year of life. He found new love and companionship with Patricia Bradley in his final chapter.

Martin was a spiritual person. He read extensively. He had a beautiful singing voice. He was a steward of land and water, and dedicated to creating a more just community. He is treasured for his insight and the way he lived a life of purpose.

He is survived by his children, Paula and Peter, and his grandchildren, Elo (2006) and Ahti (2008).

Bend Beer: A History of Brewing in Central Oregon

Presented by Jon Abernathy

Doors open at 6:00 p.m., Presentation at 7:00 p.m.

With more breweries per capita than any other Oregon city, Bend is a beer Mecca. Prior to Prohibition, the state had a burgeoning brewing industry and plenty of saloons to cater to the needs of the hardy frontiersmen who settled Central Oregon. The teetotaling '20s brought all that to a screeching halt. Fifty years later, the arrival of pioneers like Deschutes Brewery and Bend Brewing Company breathed new life into Bend's beer and brought about the booming industry for which the area is known today. Author and creator of "The Brew Site" Jon Abernathy traces Bend and Central Oregon's hoppy history from early settlement to the present day, sharing the stories behind its most famous breweries and the communities that have fostered the industry.



Jon Abernathy has been blogging about craft beer for more than a decade and drinking and homebrewing it for far longer. In 2004, Jon launched [The Brew Site](http://TheBrewSite.com), a blog dedicated to all things beer and brewing. The blog has gone on to become the longest-running American beer blog and has documented the change and rapid growth that has characterized the Bend and Central Oregon brewing scene.
